Letter from A Reader

A theme running through this Sunday's readings is the importance of *community*. The passage from the Acts of the Apostles describes the harmony of the infant Church following the gift of the Spirit; Psalm 133 extols the blessings of living together in unity; and John's Gospel recounts how Thomas missed Jesus' Easter evening appearance in the Upper Room, perhaps because he was nursing his grief and shame alone, but how on re-joining the community of disciples he was granted, in their company, an individual visitation which prompted his great confession of faith: "My Lord and my God!"

One of the purposes of our life in this world is to develop our character through *testing* (1 Peter 1.6-7). Before his Passion, Jesus warned Simon Peter that 'Satan has demanded to sift all of you like wheat.' Our own community of St Margaret's has been going through an experience a *little* bit like that of the Apostles on Good Friday. Without an incumbent, we feel rather like "sheep without a shepherd". I suggest we should view this time as an experience of salutary *testing*, and be on our guard!

A kindly parson was planning a children's service. He wanted to include the well-known children's hymn, 'Do no sinful action.' However, he worried that the children might be frightened by verse 3:

There's a wicked spirit
Watching round you still
And he tries to tempt you
To all harm and ill.

So he changed the words to 'There's a *blessed* spirit . . .' It was only during the service that he realised that the next verse began 'But ye must not hear him!'

It's easy to think that the Bible's references to Satan and demons is merely the imagery of a less sophisticated age than our own; but the Gospels make it very clear that Jesus was engaged throughout his ministry in warfare with the powers of evil; and Paul reminds us that 'Our struggle is not against enemies of blood and flesh, but against . . the cosmic powers of this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places' (Ephesians 6.12).

In my last letter, I wrote about the value of stillness and silence. St Ignatius' *Spiritual Exercises* are intended to develop in the individual the 'discernment of spirits': we need to be able to tell whether the promptings of our hearts really come from God or from somewhere else! God works in us at the deepest, innermost level of our being; so we practise stilling the more superficial demands of our nature in our prayer-times, and opening up our inner core to him. Very gradually, he will start to transform us, so that we begin to reflect him unconsciously in all our behaviour, expressed through the prism of our individual personalities. We may not even be aware of it ourselves, but others will notice.

A lovely recent piece of 'slow TV', still available on iPlayer, is *Brotherhood*, an hour-long programme about the monks of Mount St Bernard Abbey. It touches on the challenges of living in community. And although they were written about eighty years ago, C S Lewis's witty books, *The Screwtape Letters* and *Screwtape Proposes a Toast*, are still very pertinent in their analysis of the temptations to which churchgoing Christians are prey.

'**The strife is o'er**' by **Henry Ley** is a hymn-anthem based on the tune Vulpius which is used for 'The strife...' and also for 'Good Christian men rejoice and sing', both fine Easter hymns. It gives a chance for different parts of the choir to shine in the various verses, and for the organ to blaze out in its usual splendid Easter way.

The melody was published in Jena in 1609, while the words are from a Latin hymn of the 17th century, translated by Francis Pott (1832 - 1909). Henry Ley (1887 - 1962) became organist of Christchurch Cathedral Oxford when he was still an undergraduate, and moved in 1926 to Eton as 'Precentor' (Director of Music) till retirement in 1945. His other well-known piece of church music was the setting of a prayer of Henry VI (who founded the school at Eton and also King's College Cambridge).
